## **LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Dear Friends,

I came to MUST seven years ago with a dream of changing lives to better reflect my reality. Ironically, in the process of serving, I have been changed. I have learned that my perception of who my neighbors in need are may be any of the following: a person who is in my Sunday school class or ride's my daughter's school bus. It may be someone standing in line in front of me at the grocery store. Some have master's degrees and some are hard working men and women who have been faced with an illness or some other life changing event. Below are some other life lessons that I have learned about the many and diverse faces of homelessness and poverty:

- You can't always spot someone in need by their appearance.
- Sometimes people end up in poverty or homelessness simply because there is no family to serve as a safety net.
- Sometimes life deals hard blows that change our economic status overnight.
- People depend so much on credit that in reality they may be just one paycheck away from homelessness.
- Sometimes poor choices lead to homelessness or poverty.
- Children are innocent victims of homelessness and poverty.

MUST has worked in the community for 37 years helping our neighbors in need. Annually over 20,000 people are served. In recent years we have outgrown the MUST facilities and regularly have to turn people away from the Elizabeth Inn, MUST's emergency shelter. The space for day services such as the location where client's needs are assessed, the clothes closet, food pantry, and classroom space for employment readiness training are inadequate.

In our lifetime, the needs of those living in poverty and homelessness have increased and show no sign that it will decline. Poor economic forecasts including rising oil rates, rising health insurance costs and lack of affordable housing, rampant foreclosures, corporate downsizing, and more single heads of households will bring more and more people to our doorstep. MUST is quite typically the first place a person turns to in time of trouble and in many cases it is their last hope. Together, we MUST be prepared to address the needs of our neighbors who are struggling with the basic necessities of life. Together, we can be the change that turns despair into hope.

The bags were made to order for exactly these 36 men that God knew would be there that morning. I felt ‘Christmas’ in my heart as I pulled out to the waves, cheers and smiles of so many men who needed a bit of encouragement that morning. ## Supportive Housing New Veterans Program

The Supportive Housing Program in Cobb County now consists of two programs. The Cobb Supporting Housing Program was established in Feb 2005 and can house chronically homeless, disabled individuals. The newest Supportive Housing Program within Cobb County is the Veteran's Program.

The Veteran's Program is an 18 bed, 9 apartment program that reaches out to those who served our country and now live with a disability and in the throws of homelessness. These veterans range from Vietnam Vets to our most recent veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan.

In Supportive Housing we strive to provide housing, foundational support, and a new direction in the lives of those we serve. Our veteran's program is in need of some of the basic necessities of life. We provide a completely furnished, move in ready apartment for the people we serve and are in need of some of the things that make these residences a home. In May, 2007, MUST presented the first Servant Leader award to Cobb Commission Chair Sam Olens. The award is given in memory of beloved MUST leader, Ginger Kaney, who passed away October 9, 2006, after a long battle with breast cancer. Ginger was Executive Director of MUST Ministries from 1986 – 1989, and exemplified the term "servant leader." It was because of Ginger's vision and courage that MUST entered a pivotal stage in its growth, from a church basement ministry to a full-fledged mission center for low-income and homeless neighbors in Cobb and Cherokee counties.

Some Stars Shine on the Marquee...others shine in everyday life! Earl E. Smith is certainly one of those stars who shine in everyday life! Mr. Smith's service in this community spans over four decades. His service to government, business, health, education and the arts has enhanced commerce and the quality of life. He was named *Marietta Daily Journal* Citizen of the Year for

2001. In 2005, citizens organized a public reception to honor his lifetime of dedicated service and contributions.

Earl currently serves as the chairman of the Cobb-Marietta Coliseum and Exhibit Hall Authority. He is an appointee of Governor Sonny Perdue to the Georgia State Board of Technical and Adult Education, an advisor to the Cobb Symphony Orchestra, and Chairman of the Friends of the Strand committee, a fundraising effort to renovate the 1930s-era theater in Marietta. He also serves on the boards of Bank of North Georgia, Cobb County YMCA, Georgian Club, and KSU Golden University.

## NEWS FROM..



### MUST CHEROKEE



MUST Cherokee is celebrating its 20th anniversary of service to Cherokee Countians. We are honored that together with our generous community we have been able to serve the needs of so many for so long and look forward to continued faithful service.

### MUST MARIETTA

The staff supporting the Elizabeth Inn has been discussing for some time how to enhance the opportunities for our guests to make positive change. We are proud to announce that we are beginning the pilot for our “Coaching for Success” program. With Alycia Davis taking the point, the Chandler interns/volunteers have been oriented to the program. They will begin over the couple of weeks to work with a small number of Elizabeth Inn guests by “coaching” them as they move through the program. As the pilot is beginning, the development of the next phase is already underway. The future plan is to train staff and volunteers to be “coaches”, enabling every guest to be individually supported.

Applications are being taken for the Vets program and our first apartments were opened March 1. We’re taking referrals/applications for all the supportive housing programs. Individuals for the Cobb and Cherokee programs must meet some basic criteria:

- ~ Lived in homelessness for 1 year; or 4 times in last 3 yrs
- ~ Live with a verifiable (physicians signature) disability or; receive SSI/SSDI

For the veteran’s program the criteria is basically the same except that only vets (must be verifiable) can be served. We can serve veterans in the other programs as well. Alycia Davis handles the intake process for all applicants by appointment. Alycia can be reached at 678-218-4517.

The Elizabeth Inn served 271 residents over the past 5 months, 66,854 lbs. of food were given out from the pantry, 64,331 hours of volunteer work were donated, 91 people were helped with rent, 102 people were helped with utilities, and 9,181 community lunches were served in the Loaves & Fishes kitchen.

### MUST SMYRNA

What a great way to start a week – a note from one of our Employment Service clients:

*“I just wanted to tell you that I have been at KFC working and I haven’t had time like I want to come see you, but I wanted to let you know that I want to thank you very much for helping me and I don’t know what I would do if you weren’t there—you are truly a blessing. I am truly appreciative of my job and I just got my computer out of the pawn shop so I can look for another job online. I’m really glad God put you in my life, you helped me get through some hard times when I wanted to give up. You gave me a reason to move on again. Thank you and God Bless You!!!” ML*

Another wonderful event happened at Smyrna last week:

*“One of our long time clients recently came back to see us. We had worried about him. The last time we saw “George”, he had a black eye, cuts and bruises, a broken collar bone and his arm in a sling. His is the typical life of a street alcoholic and we had watched his health deteriorate over several months. He refused to go back to the hospital because he’d promised the nurses he’d stop drinking and was embarrassed to return. That was 13 months ago and none of his buddies had seen him.”*

*“When George walked into our office last week he was clean, clear-eyed, sober and healthy. He had been brought back from the brink of death and we all knew it. There were tears and shouts of joy, lots of hugs and encouraging words as we sent him back to Decatur to the residential alcoholic program that had saved his life. His former drinking buddies were also present for the celebration with words of admiration for his willpower and confirmation of just how close to death he had been. We may never know the impact of that short event in the MUST Smyrna lobby, but my prayer is that all those who witnessed it will have renewed hope that they, too, can begin a new life free from the nightmare of addiction, and that ‘George’ soaked up all the love and encouragement he received that day to see him through until we meet again.”*

We are very grateful to our donors for providing a MUST “safety net” for so many in our community. MUST Smyrna welcomed 26 new volunteers during the last year, and has found employment for 175 individuals.

## EDUCATION & EMPLOYMENT

Education & Employment in Marietta is now offering a new class within the 48 hrs Program. This class is being implemented in hopes of removing the obstacle of unfamiliarity of the on-line job search method. More and more jobs are posted on line, in newspapers, job sites and even labor agencies. Cobb Works and The Georgia Department of Labor now use emails as a standard means of replying to applicants. Although the 48 hrs Program enlists volunteers to guide our guests during their on-line job search, there was a need to offer some type of computer training that would allow them to successfully continue their on-line job search after the 48 hr Program.

We have been able to recruit a KSU Intern to facilitate the “How to conduct an on-line job search” class. Our warehouse has provided a monitor, computer, and keyboard in order to allow the guest to practice in the classroom while being instructed by the Intern which in turn reduces resistance by the guest and gives them confidence while conducting the on-line job search.

“I recently attended a Job Fair at the Marietta Civic Center. There were two floors of employers’ booths lining the walls and in the center of the room. As I passed by one of the last booth, a woman called my name out. “Ms. Vivian, Ms. Vivian”! When I turned and looked, I saw a well dressed young woman in her thirties standing behind one of the booths, handing out literature on the organization she was representing.

There are scores of people that pass through the 48 hrs Program, a new group of clients every Monday and Thursday. A thankful number of who obtain employment and move on to apartments and personal homes. I don’t feel slighted in the least that they do not come back to share their successes with me. Being homeless and unemployed is an experience that most do not want to revisit in any way. However, infrequently I do meet those that I have served in the Elizabeth Inn shelter in the general course of life; in malls, restaurants and theaters. Some I recall and others I don’t have a clue even after they identify themselves, but I am always thankful that when they mention their stay with MUST and their interaction with the 48 hours Program, it is a positive memory for them, a pleasant moment in the mist of a difficult circumstance.

This young woman had obtained a position helping others find employment. That was ironic; she was using some of the material she had gathered from MUST’s Education and Employment classes. That’s continuing fruitfulness for MUST. I felt as if I was one small ripple in the pond that God had stirred.”

This past year MUST added employment and educational services to our programming in Canton. On Monday's Ronnie Holbert with the help of volunteers brings his GED ministry to our location to aid our clients on developing their skills to master the GED exam. On Monday afternoon's MUST Marietta's Vivian Furtick instructs our financial assistance clients on budgeting basics. Tuesday through Thursday our Employment Coordinator, Beth Ray, and volunteers, helps our clients with resume writing, job search, interviewing skills, job retention ideas and referrals. Fridays bring a cadre of dedicated volunteers teaching English language skills to our clients who speak other languages. We are thrilled at the ability to bring these new and most needed services to our community in Cherokee County.
